RE: City Park Upgrades

On September 24, 2025, the City held a Public Open House to gather community input regarding proposed improvements to City Park. The event, hosted by Parkitecture + Planning, was well attended with approximately 50 participants. Attendees reviewed conceptual imagery, provided written comments, and discussed ideas for enhancing park amenities.

The discussion and comment cards covered a wide range of topics, including playground renovation, pool facilities, accessibility, pathway connections, and parking.

Discussion Items for the Parks Committee:

At this meeting, the Parks Committee should discuss the following key questions:

- Key elements of City Park
- Pickleball: Should it be included in the City Park concept design, or should staff investigate other park locations that may be better suited for this activity?
 - When considering this, it may be helpful to reference best practices for pickleball courts, including:
 - Courts should ideally be located at least 200 feet from nearby residential properties to reduce potential noise impacts.
 - Where close proximity to homes cannot be avoided, acoustic screening (e.g., fencing with sound-dampening material or landscape buffers) should be considered.
 - Lighting and parking should be designed to minimize disturbance to adjacent neighborhoods.

Next Steps:

- Parkitecture + Planning will incorporate community feedback from the open house into several conceptual design options for City Park.
- These concept plans will be presented to the Parks Committee for review and discussion at an upcoming meeting.
- Following that review, staff and Parkitecture + Planning will prepare a refined preferred concept to be shared with the Committee of the Whole for further direction.

Plymouth City Park Re-Development PIM Summary Memo 25 0924



The City of Plymouths held a public information meeting to gather resident input on potential improvements for the open space known as City Park. Approximately 50 people were in attendance and held discussions from 5;30-6;30 PM. The meeting consisted of a brief overview presentation of the process, followed by general resident questions and discussion. Residents were then asked to review the character images and provide written comments and preferences. The following summarizes the input gathered.

Verbal Discussion Items:

- The existing ball diamond may need some improvements for spectators and ADA compliance.
- The outfield area may be underutilized.
- The existing path on the south end of the park by the Stone house could be rerouted
- The existing playground equipment is in very poor condition and needs to be replaced

Written Comment Card Responses:

The following comments are verbatim from written comment cards collected at the meeting.

- City of Plymouth needs pickleball courts Dave Vorpagel
- Would love to see tennis courts (pickleball brought back to the city park like there used to be. It was also promised that they would be put back in when the new swimming pool was put in many years ago – Jeff Versch
- I swim laps 2x week but don't see the need for a lap pool (outdoor). There are multiple indoor options for swimming in the county. Deb Padgett
- Please add an entrance off of Guhrke (midway) in the park. Many people park/walk along Guhrke to enter on each end. I support the addition of a lap pool because I see it as an opportunity for increased hours for adult exercise. Would favor improvements to skate park great for our youth (add shade to the area) Kathy Halloran
- Would love to see a splashpad be constructed. All inclusive play equipment to replace the current equipment which is horrible!! Perhaps security cameras for the particular area. Needs more shade in certain areas of current play areas Anonymous
- Please make a path to connect the path by the maple sugar shack and the path on the north side. Please make the lap pool 25 yards Jonathan Dudzinski
- If possible, please change the path on the east side next to 114 Grove Street. When folks walk up the path, they can look into our bedroom window Jonathan Dudzinksi
- I like the turf (surfacing) best. A pickleball court or tennis court is better than the lap pool. Please replace the wooden structures so kids don't get slivers Mari Falk
- Really like the shaded options (playgrounds). Like handicap accessibility, like the multilevel turf, like the concrete skate park additional options for bikes would be neat. Like the volleyball court moved. Like the options of lap pool with restrooms – Linsay Watkins
- Would like to see pickleball courts in the park in the area by the basketball courts or some court stile that would combine these activities – Anonymous
- Use outfield to expand skate park. Splashpad! Trail to connect lower to sugar shack.
 Parking by west shelter. Speed bump on Grove Street. Water drainage @ South end east

- of shelter. Plant colorful trees. Sugar maples etc. don't take away trees. Lap pool is there enough coverage of employees? Mike Haucke
- Needs to be fully accessible, theme similar to "farm Park" or a different theme. Cheese capitol, cheese and mice? Walking paths updated. Continue with picnic areas. Platteville smith park is great. People come from out of town to use the park Anonymous





We support the addition of a lap lanes at the City Pool. The pool is a great resource for people in the City of Plymouth. Susie and I have been members of the Plymouth community for 47 years. The outdoor pool has always been something we value and appreciated for our family. The pool is a valued resource for prospective residents and a great attraction for the city.

We were on the pool committee when the "new" pool was being designed in 2001. We wanted lap lanes at that time but the architect didn't want to see lap lanes but instead pushed for a sand volley ball court. When we saw the Plymouth Review article that discussed the addition of lap lanes where the volley ball court we were thrilled.

That space should be used for lap lanes rather than another pickle ball court. Pickle ball courts don't seem to be the right fit for that area. An addition of lap lanes to the pool area would be a better fit and could be used by all ages. It is an existing use that would be able to take advantage of the infrastructure already being used for pool activities.

Pickle ball courts could be developed in many other places. Current park users and neighbors may not want to see a new use or hear the noise of pickle ball being played. It doesn't seem to fit in the ambiance of a park setting or be the best use of the existing facilities.

We appreciate your consideration of our thoughts on the pool upgrade.

I know pickleball courts are wanted. Cathy did mention why they wouldn't work the best in City Park though (noise).

Thank you for your interest in investing in City Park. I was unable to attend the meeting a

few days ago.

I've run the youth softball program for a number of years, and believe there is

tremendous potential with city park field.

The current fence system is extremely dilapidated, with areas that need attention or

injury could occur. A full replacement would be recommended.

There is also no current seating for fans. We would like to see bleachers or stadium

seating for parents, grandparents, and friends. A concrete pad would need to be poured

or seats built into the hill by the field.

We also feel there is potential for concessions by adding onto the current storage shed.

Lastly, we feel the lighting system is in need of a major upgrade. The poles are there, but

the lights haven't functioned in years. This would be a great feature for night games in the

summer for our young community athletes.

This ballpark is being used more and more at the developmental, rec, and travel levels,

and investing in this ballfield would enhance the area and add to the beauty of our city.

If you would like a more thorough proposal I'd be happy to offer this.
